### Key Birding Areas and Information

Prince Gallitzin State Park provides a wonderful opportunity to view the spring waterfowl migration. Beginning in March, wood duck, gadwall, American wigeon, American black duck, mallard, northern shoveler and both species of teal congregate amid the aquatic vegetation. Out on the open water, there can be rafts of diving ducks like canvasback, redhead, ring-necked duck, bufflehead, both scaup, all three mergansers, common loon, and pied-billed and horned grebes.

A good place to see waterfowl is to park in the lot directly to the left of the entranceway to the PA Game Commission maintenance building along Marina Road (SR 1026) and walk to the bridge crossing the Slate Lick Branch of Glendale Lake. Be quiet and patient checking among the vegetation for puddle ducks. Virginia rail and sora also inhabit the shallow cattail marshes along the north side of the road.

Glendale Dam is a great place to observe migrating tundra swan that frequently arrive in flocks of hundreds of swans from late February through early April.

During late March into May, the nuptial flights of American woodcock can be observed at dusk in the field beside Pickerel Pond and in the fields below the Headache Hill water tank between Long Road and the Killbuck Branch of the lake.

Bald eagles arrive at the park in late February on their trip north. They can be encountered at just about any area of the lake perched in trees or flying over the ice/water. Eagles are occasionally seen on the Slate Lick Branch of the lake during the summer months.

Osprey begin migrating the first week of April and are often seen perched in trees around the lake. An osprey nest platform is in the Slate Lick, Wyerough, and Killbuck branches of the lake.

During the summer months, park trails lead into the interiors of the forests, which are good places to see warblers and deep forest birds. Park in the day use area lots near the trailheads.

The fields along Long Road are home to many field and brush species such as catbird, brown thrasher, song, field, and chipping sparrows, meadowlark, red-winged blackbird, eastern kingbird, house wren, bluebird, tree swallow and occasional forest species passing through.

During late November and into December, goldeneyes are common visitors to the lake along with occasional scoters during storms and bad weather.

In the winter months, American robin, an occasional hermit thrush, mixed flocks of sparrows and purple finch may be found around the park in the day-use areas. As soon as the water opens up, sometimes as early as February, waterfowl begin to arrive.
