## THE DISTRICT OFFICE

This District Office is open 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM Monday through Friday. The office can be contacted by telephone, regular mail, or email. Forest Rangers patrol the State Forest off-hours, weekends, and holidays, as well as during the week.

Motorized off-road vehicles (all-terrain vehicles, trail bikes, etc.) are NOT permitted in the Forbes State Forest. The use of these vehicles will not be tolerated. State Forest visitors who encounter these uses and can provide information that will help us in this effort are encouraged to contact the District Office.

## CAMPING DEFINED

The Bureau of Forestry defines camping as one of the following:

- **Motorized Camping**—Camping in or near a vehicle, where the vehicle continues to be used for storage or transportation.
- **Primitive Camping**—Camping where all equipment is transported in one trip by a non-motorized methods, and where a motor vehicle is not located near or part of the camping experience.
- **Group Camping**—10 or more people in a group. This requires written permission from the District Forester.

## FORBES STATE FOREST

Pennsylvania contains about 17 million acres of forestland. Of this total, over two million acres are in the state forest system, which is publicly owned and managed by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, Bureau of Forestry.

The Forbes State Forest comprises about 60,000 acres located in Westmoreland, Somerset and Fayette Counties. This area within the Laurel and Chestnut Ridges is often called the Laurel Highlands.

State Forests provide clean water, recreation, habitat for plants and animals, places to enjoy the tranquility of nature, and produce some of the most valuable timber in the world.

The elevation ranges between 1,500 feet above sea level to 3,213 feet at Mt. Davis in Somerset County—the highest point in Pennsylvania. These elevation changes can cause quite different weather conditions throughout the forest. Changes can and do occur quite rapidly during the year, and forest visitors should be prepared. Higher elevations are usually snow covered by mid-November and may remain that way until April.

## MOTORIZED CAMPING GUIDELINES

- Camping is permitted at **designated sites only**—refer to the attached map.
- Camping permit is required, must be displayed at the site or be in possession at all times. Permits are issued on a first-come first-served basis, not prior to 90 days in advance.
- Due to limited sites, one permit/month limit.
- Sites available from April 2 to last day of regular rifle deer season.
- Camping ‘week’ runs from Friday to following Thursday for those staying a full weekend, or 7 consecutive days.
- Camping ‘day’ runs noon to the following noon.
- No more than 2 vehicles, and no more than 10 people, allowed at the site.
- No human or animal waste is permitted in or near designated sites. All waste must be stored and removed using a holding tank, portable toilet or other means. There are no disposal sites on the Forbes State Forest.
- Dead and downed wood may be gathered and burned when permitted, but may not be removed from the site. Power tools and chain saws are not permitted.
- Small campfires are permitted in the designated fire ring, when adequate precautions are taken to prevent spread of fire into the forest, subject to closures.

## MOTORIZED CAMPING (CONTINUED)

- No facilities such as water pumps, showers, utility hookups or bathrooms are available.
- Open fires are prohibited when the forest fire danger is determined by the District Forester to be High, Very High, or Extreme—and from March 1 through May 25, and from October 1 through December 1 without authorization from the District Forester. **This prohibition does not apply to self-contained camp stoves used in a safe manner.**
- No nails in trees, or damage to any vegetation will be permitted.
- All strings, rope, wire, etc. must be removed prior to leaving.
- Sites are not maintained for snow removal.
- All trash must be removed from the Forbes State Forest.

## AREAS CLOSED TO CAMPING

- Roaring Run Natural Area and Mt. Davis Natural Area.
- The area east of Laurel Summit Road and north of Weaver Road.
- Blue Hole, along Blue Hole Road.
- Falls Run, along Falls Run Road.
- Cole Run Falls, along Cole Run Road.
- Pine Knob overlook.
- Within 300 feet of Leased Campsites.
- Within 300 feet of a State Forest Picnic Area: Lick Hollow and Mt. Davis.
- Any other area posted against camping.

## PRIMITIVE CAMPING GUIDELINES

- Camping permit required only if staying more than one night at a site (see section on camping permits).
- Camping must be a minimum of 100 feet from any stream or open water source.
- Camp sites must be at least 200 feet from and out of sight of roads and parking areas, and 25 feet and out of site of the nearest edge of a trail.
- Field privies must be at least 200 feet from a lake, stream, spring, or other open water source—and all human waste must be buried a minimum of 6 inches.
- All trash must be carried out of the forest.
- All stone fire rings must be scattered.
- **No group camping is permitted without written permission of the District Forester.**
- Regulations for campfires are the same as those Motorized Camping, except that there are no designated fire rings.

## HORSES

- Tether lines must be used when horses are kept on site. Horses may NOT be tied directly to trees or shrubs.
- Horses may not be tied in or near streams or other water sources.
- Manure must be removed from all designated Motorized Camping sites, and all parking areas.
- Manure must be scattered in the woods at least 100 feet from all Primitive Camping sites.

## CAMPING PERMITS

- Camping permits are free, and may be obtained from the District Office during normal working hours.
- They are required for all Motorized Camping (you can fill out an online application from DCNR’s website).
  - Permits for Primitive Camping are required only for stays more than one night at any campsite. **However, all campers are encouraged to obtain a permit.** Should a camper become lost or overdue, a permit provides the district staff with a location to start looking for them. The permit also helps the district staff locate the camper in an emergency.
  - Camping permits will be valid for no more than 7 consecutive nights, then the campsite must be vacated for 48 hours, and all vehicles and equipment removed from State Forest land.
  - Camping permits will not be issued to anyone under the age of 18.



## SITE 1

**Directions:** Route 30 to Laurel Summit Road, take Laurel Summit Road 5 miles, make right turn onto JE Miller Road, proceed to gate, go through gate 4/10ths mile, site is on left side of road.


**Special Instructions:** You must have a combination to get through gate on JE Miller Rd. Gate must be closed and locked each time you pass through.



## SITE 2

**Directions:** Route 30 to Laurel Summit Road, Laurel Summit Road 6 miles to Hickory Flats Road, 1 mile to Zufall Trail, make left on Zufall Trail, site is 1/10th mile on left, just before gate.

**Special Instructions:** Gate and trail must be unobstructed at all times.



## SITE 3

**Directions:** From Route 40, Skyline Drive 3.3 miles to Kirby Road, make left on Kirby Road and go 9/10ths mile, site is on left side of road.


**Special Instructions:** Kirby Road is a township road, be careful turning into and pulling out of site. Keep all vehicles off of Kirby Road.



## SITE 4


**Directions:** From Route 40 take Wharton Furnace Road about 2.5 miles to Shepard Road, make right onto Shephard road and go 1.5 miles to Brethren Summit Road, make left onto Brethren Summit Road and go 1.4 miles, site is on your left.

**Special Instructions:** Brethren Summit Road is a narrow, gravel, township road. Use caution.



## SITE 5

**Directions:** From Route 31 (Bakersville), go south on Trent Road about 2.75 miles to Copper Kettle Highway. Turn right and go a little over a mile to Trent. Make left on Barron Chuch Road, go about 1.25 miles and make right on Gary Road, go 2 miles and make right on Cole Run Road, site is about 1 mile on right—1/4 mile past Glade Road.



## SITE 6

**Directions:** From State Route 2004, proceed east from Mt. Davis Picnic Area, 4/10 of a mile east of Shelter Rock Road, entrance road is on your right.

**Special Instructions:** You must have a combination to get through the gate on. Gate must be closed and locked each time you pass through.
